1. How does Cornell's unique status as both an elite lvy and a land-grant institution position it to improve the world? How can the trustees and alumni support Cornell's mission?

Any problem can be solved in four steps: 1) identify the problem, 2) understand the problem, 3) develop a solution and 4) implement the solution. Elite institutions specialize in the first two, while the successes of land-grant universities are measured by achieving the second two. Cornell is in the unique position of having the talent to address all four. Today's challenges require multi-disciplinary and iterative approaches. The greatest breakthroughs are often achieved through collaborations across academic boundaries, and Cornell is unique in successfully creating these vibrant collaborations and addressing some of the world's most pressing challenges. By supporting collaborations with talent and treasure, trustees and alumni are directly supporting Cornell's mission.

2. How do you envision the Board of Trustees supporting Cornell's priority to strengthen and broaden diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives across the university?

Diversity, equity and inclusion are not new concepts for Cornell. When the university was founded as a non-sectarian and co-educational institution, it was viewed as an 'experiment' along both dimensions. Over time, Cornell expanded both the definitions and dimensions of 'any student' and developed the academic ecosystem necessary to provide each student the opportunity to succeed while they were on campus and beyond. It is the Board of Trustees' place to enable, encourage and ultimately ensure that Cornell continue to embrace bold 'experiments.' As in the past, Cornell can demonstrate to the world that this generation's version of diversity, equity and inclusion is not only possible, but can be wildly successful.

3. Why do you hope to serve on the board and how are you uniquely suited to contribute to Cornell's success?

I am a first generation Cornellian, a scientist and an entrepreneur. I am eternally grateful for my Cornell experience. The opportunity to serve as a trustee and give back to the institution that has given me so much is an honor.
